ROSH HASHANAH

Rosh Hashanah is a festival that celebrates the Jewish New Year. According to the Torah, the holiday is known as the day of blowing the shofar (ram's horn). In rabbinic literature it came to also commemorate the birthday of the world and the beginning of a 10-day period of reflection where all humankind is judged for their deeds.

GREETING: Shanah Tovah (Happy New Year).

CLOSURES: The J closes at 5:45 PM on Fri, Sep 11th, and reopens on Mon, Sep 14th.

YOM KIPPUR

Yom Kippur is the Jewish Day of Atonement. It is marked by a sunset to nightfall fast, synagogue worship focused on repentance for past sins, forgiveness of others who have sinned against us, gratitude for God's mercy, and a commitment to improved behavior in the future.

GREETING: G'mar Chatimah Tovah (May you be sealed for a good year).

CLOSURES: The J closes at 4 PM on Sun, Sep 20th, and reopens on Tue, Sep 22nd.

SUKKOT

Sukkot is a joyous harvest holiday marked by the construction of temporary outdoor huts (sukkot) in which friends and families gather for meals. These open and flexible structures remind us of the Israelites' wandering in the desert, as well as our own vulnerability and dependence on God and each other.

GREETING: Chag Sameach (May you have a joyful holiday).

CLOSURES: The J closes at 5:45 PM on Fri, Sep 25th, and reopens on Mon, Sep 28th.

SHEMINI ATZERET/ SIMCHAT TORAH

Shemini Atzeret occurs on the eighth day after the start of Sukkot and is considered a holiday in itself. It is a day with special prayers for rain and is the beginning of the season which determines the fertility of land in the year to come. Simchat Torah celebrates the end of the annual Torah reading cycle and the immediate start of the new cycle. It is a festive day on which we march, dance, and sing with the Torah scrolls.

GREETING: Chag Sameach (May you have a joyful holiday).

CLOSURES: The J closes at 5:45 PM on Fri, Oct 2nd, and reopens on Mon, Oct 5th.

HANUKKAH

Hanukkah, or the Festival of Lights, is a joyous holiday commemorating the ancient unlikely victory of the Macabees over a much larger Syrian-Greek army. Jews regained their holiest site, the Temple in Jerusalem, and rededicated it to Jewish worship. This is a time for acknowledging miracles both ancient and contemporary.

GREETING: Happy Hanukkah, Chag Urim Sameach (Happy festival of lights).

CLOSURES: The J is open regular hours during Hanukkah.

TU B'SHEVAT

Tu B'Shevat is considered the New Year of the Trees and marks the start of spring in Israel, when trees begin to bloom after a long, cold winter. Today, many people celebrate by planting saplings, participating in a meal that evokes the Passover seder, working in a garden, and eating special fruit and nuts.

GREETING: Chag Sameach (May you have a joyful holiday).

CLOSURES: The J is open regular hours during Tu B'Shevat.

Sundown, Mar 22–Nightfall, Mar 23

PURIM

Purim commemorates the thwarting of a plot to exterminate the Jews of ancient Persia. To celebrate, we gather to hear the reading of the Book of Esther, donate money to charity, give gifts to one another, and have a festive meal. Costumes are often worn.

GREETING: Chag Purim Sameach (Happy Purim).

CLOSURES: The J is open regular hours during Purim.

Sundown, Apr 21–Nightfall, Apr 29

PASSOVER

Passover celebrates the exodus of the Israelites from Egypt and the move from slavery into freedom. On the first two nights, Jews may gather to tell the story and eat a ceremonial meal called a seder. During Passover, it is traditional to refrain from eating leavened food made from wheat, barley, oats, spelt and rye.

GREETING: Chag Kasher v'Sameach (Have a kosher and happy holiday).

CLOSURES: The J closes at 5:45 PM on Wed, Apr 21st, and reopens Sat, Apr 24th. The J closes again at 5:45 PM on Tue, Apr 27th, and reopens on Fri, Apr 30th.

Sundown, Jun 10–Nightfall, Jun 12

SHAVUOT

Shavout, the Feast of Weeks, occurs seven weeks after the start of Passover. In the Torah, Shavuot is a harvest festival and is observed by offering one's first fruits in the Temple in Jerusalem. It later developed as the holiday that celebrates the receiving of the Torah on Mt. Sinai.

GREETING: Chag Sameach (May you have a joyful holiday).

CLOSURES: The J closes at 5:45 PM on Thu, Jun 10th, and reopens on Sun, Jun 13th.

Sundown, Aug 11–Nightfall, Aug 12

TISHA B'AV

Tisha B'Av recalls many tragedies of the Jewish people. It memorializes the destructions of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem and is considered the most solemn day on the Jewish calendar.

GREETING: There is a custom not to greet each other on this holiday.

CLOSURES: The J is open regular hours during Tisha B'Av.
